2008 JUNG IN IRELAND SEMINAR FACULTY

Ashok Bedi, M.D., Jungian Analyst, and Distinguished Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association, is Clinical Professor in Psychiatry at the Medical College of Wisconsin and faculty member at the Jung Institute of Chicago. Trained in India and Great Britain, Dr. Bedi lectures and leads programs for both physicians as well as the Jungian community, with particular emphasis on the emerging frontiers of Spirituality and Healing. Some of his many publications include "Accidents and Synchronicity: Messages From the Soul;" *Path to the Soul*, and *Retire Your Family Karma*.

Jean Shinoda Bolen, M.D., is an internationally known Jungian Analyst who draws from spiritual, feminist, Jungian, medical and personal wellsprings of experience. She feels a soulful connection to Ireland and has led pilgrimages there. Psychiatrist and clinical professor at the University of California Medical Center, San Francisco, her publications include *The Tao of Psychology*; *Gods in Everyman*; *Crossing to Avalon*; *Close to the Bone*; *The Millionth Circle*, *Goddesses in Older Women*; *Crones Don't Whine* and *Urgent Message From Mother: Gather the Women, Save the World*.

Mark Patrick Hederman, a frequent guest on Irish National Television, has been a monk of Glenstal Abbey in Ireland for the last 40 years. A former headmaster of the abbey's school, he has also taught philosophy and literature in Africa, the U.S. and Europe. A founding editor of the "Journal of Irish Studies," Mr. Hederman has spent the first years of the new century wandering the world in search of the Holy Spirit, allowing inspiration and coincidence to lead him. Among his many publications are *Walkabout: Life as Holy Spirit*; *The Haunted Inkwell*; *Tarot: Talisman or Taboo?*, and *Kissing the Dark*.

Donald Kalsched Ph.D., is a clinical psychologist and Jungian Analyst with the Inter-Regional Society of Jungian Analysts. He is also a senior training analyst at the Westchester Institute for Training in Psychoanalysis and Psychotherapy in Bedford Hills, N.Y. His popular book *The Inner World of Trauma: Archetypal Defenses of the Personal Spirit* (Routledge, 1996) is in its 5th printing. Currently he lives in Albuquerque, New Mexico, where he is at work on a new book: *Trauma and the Soul: Spiritual Aspects of Psychoanalytic Work*.

Aryeh Maidenbaum, Ph.D., is a Jungian Analyst and Director of the N.Y. Center for Jungian Studies. Among his publications are "Psychological Types, Job Change and Personal Growth;" "The Search for Spirit in Jungian Psychology;" "Sounds of Silence," and *Jung and the Shadow of Anti-Semitism*. Dr. Maidenbaum was on the faculty of NYU for over eighteen years and is a contributing author to *Current Theories of Psychoanalysis*, Robert Langs, ed.

Diana Rubin, L.C.S.W., is co-Director of the N.Y. Center for Jungian Studies. Ms. Rubin was a staff psychotherapist at the Postgraduate Center for Mental Health's Institute for the Performing Artist from 1992-1998. Currently, she is in private practice in New York City and New Paltz, New York, leads workshops and seminars on creativity and Mid-Life issues, and specializes in working with creative and performing artists in both individual and group therapy.

Robin van Loben Sels, Ph.D., is a Jungian Analyst in private practice in Katonah, N.Y. and Albuquerque, New Mexico. She spends her summers in Trinity East, Newfoundland. Former co-editor of "Quadrant," Dr. van Loben Sels' publications include a collection of her poetry entitled "Wanting a Country for This Weather and Other Poems;" "When a Body Meets a Body," and *A Dream in the World: Poetics of Soul in Two Women, Modern and Medieval*. Her most recent poetry appears in the *Journal of Religion and Health* and *Quadrant*.

Nóirín Ní Riain, Ph.D., is an internationally acclaimed Irish singer who has performed worldwide. “Splitting, Reconciliation and Repair: Moving Toward Healing and Wholeness”

**Belfast & Donegal, Ireland

Both personal and political conflicts are driven by powerful archetypal energies from the unconscious. These energies amplify individual as well as collective passions and make genuine dialogue and relationship difficult.

On an individual level, personal complexes and threats to our ego-ideal are heightened through conflict. On the collective level, issues of ego-security are raised that lead to national, religious or ethnic conflicts. In general, these conflicts tend to be “mythologized” and take on a dramatic structure around the dynamic of “good” and “bad”. This dynamic often deteriorates into violence, where actual evil becomes a reality and splitting between people occur. Both ensure that the unconscious archetypal “agenda” is fulfilled.

Building on the backdrop of Northern Ireland’s conflict and recent peace process and conciliation, this seminar will explore such archetypal themes as holding the opposite forces within us, reconciliation, wholeness vs. splitting, projection of shadow, and fear of the “other”—all elements in the narratives of Northern Ireland, Africa, the Middle East, and many other parts of the world. These conflicts mirror our own individual struggles, and can inspire us to heal our personal tensions as well as societal ones.

THURSDAY, MARCH 27

Later this afternoon we will meet for Orientation and Opening presentation by **Jean Bolen**, “*Wounding and Healing as seen through a Jungian Lens*” to be followed by a festive welcoming ♦dinner (included).

FRIDAY, MARCH 28

Following the first of our daily, hearty Irish ♦breakfasts and (optional) “Dream Gathering” meetings (led by Jungian Analyst **Robin Van Loben Sels**), we will explore West Belfast—the place that experienced the most difficult times during the “Troubles.” Walking through parts of the area and viewing firsthand some of the many murals of that period, we will experience some of the history, passions and problems of the times. Lunch on our own followed by a special, guided visit and unique meeting at Stormont (home of Northern Ireland’s Government, set in beautiful parkland) with Members of Parliament and those active in the “peace movement” for discussion and exchange of ideas.

Evening: Free...with ample choice of restaurants within walking distance of the Europa.

SATURDAY, MARCH 29

This morning, we will hear from two members of our faculty—noted Jungian Analyst and author **Donald Kalsched**, who will address the topic of “*Splitting, Reconciliation and Repair: Moving Toward Healing and Wholeness in a Broken World*,” and **Mark Hederman**—Irish Monk from Glenstal Abbey and well known author, whose presentation will focus on reconciliation and repair, “*Because we are a Dialogue*.” Following group discussion, we will have time to explore Belfast on our own before meeting again early in the evening for continued dialogue and processing of our Belfast experience.

Evening: Free for dining and/or music in one of Belfast’s many pubs that are adorned with relics of the Victorian and Edwardian periods.

Departing Belfast early this morning, we will head for Donegal. En-route, we will enjoy a unique day trip to the breathtaking, scenic Antrim coast—Northern Ireland’s most spectacular coastline, including the Glens of Antrim; legendary Giants Causeway; Dunluce Castle, and Carrickfergus (one of Ireland’s oldest castles) with lunch on our own along the way. By late afternoon or early evening, we will arrive at the Carlton Red Castle Hotel in Donegal—overlooking the waters of Lough Foyle, located on the picturesque Inishowen Peninsula, and our home for the next four nights. ♦Dinner at our hotel (included).

IRELAND'S SACRED LANDSCAPE; A STUDY/TOUR IN CELTIC MYTHOLOGY

Donegal, Ireland April 11-18, 2008

This coming spring, the New York Center for Jungian Studies is pleased to offer its twelfth annual study/tour devoted to “Ireland’s Sacred Landscape.” Limited to 36 participants, this unique program is an in-depth exploration of the relationship between Ireland’s landscape and the myths that emanated from this land. The hills, seas, mountains and natural beauty of Ireland, along with its villages, ancient tombs, forts and monasteries, are dramatic indicators of the always fascinating and powerful archetypes present in the mythology.

Our 2008 study/tour will be based in unspoiled and authentically Irish County Donegal. Home of the “dispossessed Celts,” Donegal, with the largest “Gaeltacht” (Irish speaking) region in all of Ireland, contains within it an extraordinary number of pre-historic sites and ancient monuments. Known for its wild and magnificent landscape; towering cliffs; deserted golden beaches; rocky headlands and rugged coastline with hundreds of inlets and bays, County Donegal is considered a mirror image of Ireland herself.

Led by Jungian analyst **Aryeh Maidenbaum**, accompanying faculty will include internationally acclaimed Irish singer, theologian and musicologist **Nóirín Ní Riain**, and Irish professor and scholar **Maureen Concannon**. Additionally, we are fortunate to have one of Ireland’s leading archaeologists, **Michael Gibbons**, lead us on our field trips throughout Donegal. Providing an ongoing narrative, Michael will magically weave his vast knowledge of Ireland’s sacred sites and stunning scenery with stories of Irish history, her people and her culture.

SATURDAY, APRIL 12

After the first of our daily full, hearty Irish ✦breakfasts, **Dr. Maureen Concannon**, Irish Professor at University College, Dublin, will introduce us to “*Ireland: Journey of the Soul*,” and, along with Jungian Analyst **Aryeh Maidenbaum**, lead us in a study/session on “*The Cailleach—Great Goddess of pre-Celtic and Celtic Times and her Synchronistic Reappearance*.” Following a break for coffee and tea, **Nóirín Ní Riain** will inspire us in prose and song as she introduces “*New Ways of Listening and ‘Sound’ Experiences through a Retrieval of Ever-Ancient Traditions*.” This first afternoon will be free to take in some of the spectacular views accessible from the grounds of Rathmullan House, and/or explore the nearby charming town of Rathmullan—within walking distance of our hotel. In the evening, we will return to hear guest scholar **Michael Gibbons** introduce us to the landscape of Ireland with his wonderful slides and wit as he leads us through “*Seven Millennia of Irish History*.”

SUNDAY, APRIL 13

Accompanied by **Michael Gibbons** (as we will be daily), we will spend the day traveling through Southwest Donegal, including the sacred valley of Glencolumbkille, one of the foremost centers of Irish culture and music. Our day’s travel will take us through a countryside containing an extraordinary array of early Christian remains—an area of Ireland where night pilgrimages are still attended. En-route, we will have lunch (included) as we explore this fascinating valley that is interspersed with some of the largest Neolithic tombs in Northern Ireland and has a landscape that is open to the North Atlantic and ringed by bog-covered mountains.

MONDAY, APRIL 14

We will begin the morning with a visit to Glenveigh National Park and the wild mountains and bogs of West Donegal. En-route, we will have lunch, see some of the most beautiful nineteenth century houses in Ireland, 4,000 year old forests emerging from the bog and, time permitting, the Kilclooney portal tomb—off the beaten track, an impressive yet seldom visited early Neolithic tomb. Evening study/session on archetypal myth focusing on the pilgrim shrine of Lough Derg—“*Conan Finn and the Caoranach*,” followed by dinner on our own.

TUESDAY, APRIL 15

Following breakfast, we will take a trip to the incredibly well-preserved town of Derry—a city of huge conflict until the very recent past and now, thankfully, at peace. In Derry, we will walk the city's 17th century walls (never breached; one of Europe's best preserved city fortifications); visit its superb tower museum—housing the archive of the pioneering Valencera excavation in a stunning exhibit and have lunch on our own. This afternoon, we will be visiting Grinanan Ailleach—home of the Ui Neill kings of Aileach. Crowning the top of an 800 foot high hill, with panoramic views of Lough Foyle, Lough Swilly and the hills of the Fanad and Inishowen Peninsulas, Grinanan Ailleach is one of Ireland's most spectacular, circular Celtic hill forts. Evening free to experience a local, traditional Irish pub or restaurant in town.

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 16

Today we will travel North through the Inishowen Peninsula—the most Northerly point in Ireland, and a “kingdom of its own.” Traversing what many argue is the most beautiful area in all of Ireland, we will come upon one of the largest Neolithic rock art sites in Western Europe, view a ring of seascapes, mountains, valleys and woodlands and have the opportunity to appreciate the magnificent landscape of this peninsula—a microcosm of Ireland itself. Lunch along the way will be included. Evening free.

THURSDAY, APRIL 17

Today, our last full day in Ireland, we will have final study/sessions with **Maureen Concannon** and **Aryeh Maidenbaum**, on “*Folk Tales of the Silkies—Myths of Transformation*” and **Nóirín Ní Riain**, who will work with us in “*Completing the Circle of Healing through Song and Story*” as well as the opportunity to share our thoughts and feelings on what we have learned and experienced during the week. Afternoon open for personal excursions, rest and relaxation, enjoying the Rathmullan's facilities and/or last minute shopping. In the evening, we will enjoy a festive, farewell ♣dinner together.
